On April 7th, 24 Docents and Volunteers attended our Docent/ Volunteer Moonlight walk. I reviewed the guidelines and then split the group into three smaller groups. During the walks, everyone shared tips and information on how they do a walk at night. Thank you to the folks that were our walk leads and sweeps! It was too early for the moon to come up but it was a pretty evening and it was really good to see everyone!

Public walks start in May!! All walks start at 7:00 p.m. and end no later than 9:00 p.m. (Docents/volunteers should arrive by 6:45 p.m.). For public walk attendees, we ask a \$2.00 per person donation but if you wear an Eaton Canyon T-shirt or hat, or if you are an ECNCA member, the walk is free! Groups of 10 or more must make advance reservations with the Nature Center. Wear sturdy walking shoes or hiking boots, bring water and dress appropriately for the weather. No dogs are allowed on the walk (except service dogs). Walks will be canceled without prior notice due to rain or adverse canyon conditions. People cannot be in the park after the park closes (park closes at 7:30 p.m.) unless they are with an official canyon program.

Moonlight Walks 2023! Plant of the Month

Common Phacelia Botanical Name: Phacelia distans Family: Boraginaceae (Borage) **Blooms:** Spring Lifeform: Annual Herb

Habitat: Native to much of California including the coastal mountain ranges. valleys, and deserts, adjacent sections of Nevada and Arizona, and parts of northern Mexico. It grows in many types of habitats.

It was spring when I first started volunteering at the Eaton Canyon Nature Center, and had my first encounter with this beautiful pale lavender to violetblue flowering plant, growing along many of our trails. I was fascinated by the way the clusters of flowers were arranged in a coil that, to me, resembled a caterpillar. This plant turned out to be the Common Phacelia. It is also known as wild scorpionweed because others have thought the coil reminded them of a curled scorpion's tail.

While doing some research on this plant, I discovered that if you look closely, the individual flowers have five round petals and stamens that extend slightly beyond the petals. The flowers are produced

along a coiled stalk (a "scorpioid cyme") with developing buds in the center of the coil. As the stalk unfurls, new flowers open at the base of the coil while seedpods develop along the older stalk, often giving the stalk the look of a caterpillar.

Common Phacelia can be found in many plant communities, including woodlands, coastal sage scrub and chaparral, grasslands, meadows and deserts. It is a common wildflower in its range. Here at Eaton it can be found in disturbed areas along the trails. Native Americans gathered and steamed the Lasioglossum (subgen. leaves and stems during the spring, and ate them as (a sweat bee - Halictidae) greens. There are many species in the genus Phacelia

so you can also find Branching and Large-flowered Phacelia in the canyon. For those of you who like to know about family

backgrounds, I found that, as others in the borage (Boraginaceae) family, Phacelias are coated by small, stiff hairs, and have flowers that are often located along a coiled stalk. Species of Phacelia were previously placed in the waterleaf (Hydrophyllaceae) family, which has similar plant characteristics, but due to the availability of molecular data, this family was then merged into the Borage family. This is the system currently used by Jepson, the authority for this Plant Guide. However, in 2016, this was reevaluated

and many botanists have now accepted the revision that Phacelia should be found listed in a separate waterleaf family.

A few years ago, I met Hartmut Wisch, who is a local native bee expert and photographer. He showed me some native bees landing on Common Phacelia flowers in Eaton Canyon. Some of these bees can be seen in the beautiful photos included here. Butterflies and honey bees are also attracted to this plant. So keep these plants in mind for your pollinator habitat and wildflower garden, where it is grown from seed, in full sun, with good drainage, and with no irrigation once established. Brenda Hurst
