Eaton Canyon's Agnes Atkinson

In the Sept/Oct issue of Paw Prints, I wrote a short article about Ringtails and discovered Agnes Akin Atkinson and her children's book, *Blinky: A Biography of a Ringtail* (published in 1935). I decided to do a little more research on Atkinson who lived on the edge of Eaton Canyon. She authored other children's books including: *Perkey: A Biography of a Skunk* (published in 1937) and *Skinny, The Gray Fox* (published in 1936), as well as *Crooktail A Young Racoon* (published in 1940).

The February 1932 issue of *National Geographic*, contained an article by Atkinson about Eaton Canyon's wildlife, "Befriending Nature's Children: An Experiment with Some of California's Wild Folk." Because this article appeared in the widely circulated magazine, the Canyon gained international notice and led to the city of Pasadena designating the area as the Eaton Canyon Bird And Game Sanctuary in the 1930s. The article was based on the Atkinson family wanting to watch the wild animals that came out to eat only during the night at their home, so they created an outside feeding table.

I found the following excerpts by an unknown author posted on the web in a 2014 blog entitled "Rocking Thru the World, The Wild Nights in California!," that refers to the *National Geographic* article. The quotes below with page numbers refer to the page where the quote is located in the magazine. The quotes without page numbers are from the author.

"The skunk and fox families were picky but the raccoons would eat any thing and everything. The animals must have spread word of the feast to their friends." "Many evenings we have eight or nine grown foxes at our table." (p. 214)

"All the animals except one learned to mostly tolerate the flash of the camera." "Our most interesting visitor was a beautiful coyote, sleek and careful, each movement sheer grace." (p. 214) "They were afraid the flash would scare him away forever. No other animals came when the coyote was present."

Wonderful photographs of these animal visitors were taken by Agnes' hus-'

Agnes continued from page 2 band, Spencer Atkinson, who photographed for all her books and articles.



Another Agnes Akin Atkinson article, "Where Birds and Little Animals Find Haven," appeared in the National Geographic magazine's August 1936 issue. I also found an original article, with a very long title: "Br'er Possum, Hermit of the Lowlands: North America's Only Pouched Mammal, Slow-Moving Survivor of an Ancient Order, Leads a Relaxed, Solitary Life," published by National Geographic magazine in 1953.

I had mentioned my new interest in this author to a friend of mine and found out that Atkinson's octagon shaped study was situated on my friend's property. I was thrilled to find out that it still exists and was fortunate enough to be invited to see it and take some photos which I was given permission to share. It's been changed a bit over the years but much of it is the same as when she used it so many years ago. I was also shown some old photos of the Atkinson home. An inscription on the back of one photograph mentions the octagon study. "The inscription over the door bears an Indian name "Ah-Nas-ta"—meaning "get your thoughts from the hills."■

Our Eaton Canyon Conservation Group

Max Yasuda, our Conservation Group Chair, reported that on Sunday. March 10th, "we had around 20 volunteers spend the morning clearing invasive plants around the service yard. The western slope of the canyon has a ton of invasives growing on it, and the county boundary runs up to the crest, so we are taking on that slope. We probably removed 3 dozen large castor bean plants, and disposed of them in big black trash bags. We also



planted 4 golden currants in the space we cleared. We found some endangered shoulderband snails living in the service yard under a pile of discarded stones."

Trail Etiquette Essentials




